# PARAPARAUMU BRIDGE CLUB

## SEPTEMBER 2019

Welcome to a spring newsletter from your bridge club. A mixed hand of a couple of club tournaments over recent weeks, a few organizational matters, a farewell to an old stalwart and a typically aggressive bid from Leon Hunia.

But first, a word from the President, Tony Davies. Well . . . perhaps, a longer "word" than his usual allocation.

#### Table money increases.

By now, most of the membership will know that the table money will be increased from **October 1.** It rises from \$4.00 to \$5.00 per session and the cost of the multi-session tickets (MSTs) rises from \$40.00 to \$50.00 – though still providing two free sessions. It rises from that date (Oct 1) as that is the start of the club's financial year.

There is one single overriding reason for the increase: our club faces **two major capital costs in the next few months – up to \$18,000 to \$20,000 to replace all our chairs and a new water heater for the kitchen will cost \$3,000**. These costs will seriously deplete the "operating savings" carefully built up over the past few years.

The club committee is also required to maintain and build a "Building Maintenance Contingency Fund". (This has been discussed at each AGM in recent years.) That fund now stands at \$27,000. The last major club rooms refurbishment cost \$37,000 back in 2010-2011. The increase in the table fee will enable the club to increase this fund by about \$5,000 in each of the next few years.

Editor's note: Tony has also gone to the various day and night sessions over the past week to explain in person about the reasons for these regretted increases. It is always difficult when fees are raised, but Tony has certainly "fronted" the issue.

**Opening bids of 1 Club and 1 No Trump.** These bids **require** the opener's partner to immediately give an explanation of what the bid means. It is **NOT** enough just to say, following a 1 Club opening bid, "it's natural". The partner **must** indicate the minimum number of clubs the opener will hold.

The No Trump bid **requires** the partner to specify the **range of points** held by the opener ie 12-14, 12-15, (possibly 13-15 if vulnerable ?) etc. There are a few Goren users and their range will be 16+

**The Thursday "day" session**. Currently, this session starts at 10.30. It will be moved to an afternoon in 2020. The average tables played is only 4.5 and the committee hopes that moving the session time to an afternoon may increase support. In addition, the current director will not be playing the "day" session next year. This is **a trial** and will be reviewed by the committee mid- year in 2020.

A new committee for 2020. Only 5-6 of the current committee are standing for re-election. I hope that all members will consider serving, even if only for a term. The club simply cannot function with only a dedicated few doing the work. For example, there are 32 various jobs that need to be allocated – either to committee members or to those who accept tasks outside the committee. (A list of these jobs would take up Keith's whole newsletter!)

In particular, I have to stress that we will need **a new Vice President**, and an **"understudy" for Treasurer**, as Colleen will finish at the end of 2020. We need someone to be on the committee and learn the role by working with Colleen through 2020 and then taking over as Treasurer in 2021.

Thanks . . . and a little snippet of good news. **The year's final week of play, leading up to Christmas (starting Monday 9 December) will be free at all sessions.** A small "thank you" to all members for their support over the year.

Yes, the Forsyth Barr Sponsored Christmas Pairs! Last tournament of the year and another "in house" day.


Finally, one hand from the Novella Tournament on September 8.

You pick out your cards and start sorting them. And then you sort them again, just to make sure, because not only do you hold ten diamonds, but more, they are headed by Ace, King, Queen, Jack, ten and on and on. And you are sitting East and you see that you are the Dealer. What are you going to bid? And East-West are vulnerable but not North South.

Here is your hand.

	• A K Q J 10 9 8 7 5 3
	♣Q97

Only 12 points but 9 tricks off the top. If partner has points, then you want to be in slam and you want to call it right now ie DIAMONDS. On the other hand, if North-South have points, they will have a game their way, maybe even a slam? Might a massive pre-empt be a good sacrifice? Even at unfavourable vulnerability? One player sitting East was not going to die wondering.

I was sitting South and watched Leon casually inscribe "6 D" as his opening bid on the pad. I don't think I've seen anyone write down a slam as their opening bid. I passed meekly – around to my partner who promptly doubled.



According to Pianola (double dummy), we should have taken Leon three light but he must have played better than we defended and only went down by two. Still, a plus score of 500. Had to be useful? And yet, a slam in Spades is cold and a slam in Hearts might make. Three East-West pairs went 2 light (in 5Dx, 5Dx or 6Dx), a couple of North-South pairs went one light when they tried the slam in Hearts, several played in 4/5 Hearts or Spades making 11 or 12 tricks (and in one case 13 tricks!) but no one achieved the optimum bid of 6 Spades.

Only one North-South pair bid and made a slam (in Hearts) on this hand – so congratulations to Lou MacDonald and Lance Johnson.
