displayed. (The dummies were the cards on the table, by the way, not the two very capable and highly experienced players . . .)


A COUPLE OF WORTHY RESULTS

AN AMUSING HAND

Dealer = East and E/W Vulnerable



The aggressive bidding sequence went like this:

West	North	East	South
		3♣	Pass
3♥	Pass (!)	4♥	Pass
Pass	5 ♣ (!)	Pass	6♦
Pass	7 🔸	All pass	

After East's pre-emptive opening bid and West's 3♥ response (showing support for the Clubs, but maybe game in Hearts might work?) what would you bid on the North cards? The event is the prestigious European Open Trials . . . and North was the only North in the room to pass. North happened to be Alex Hydes, one of England's top players.

North figured he didn't want to bid 4♣ because a cue bid like that should indicate both majors. True, West had bid hearts but his partner might still think he held the majors. So

North decided to wait. Was there a risk East might pass 3♥? Not really, as usually that bid and response is forcing for one round. East duly raised his partner to 4♥.

Now North decided it was time to enter the fray. He cue bid $5 \stackrel{•}{•}$ (!), his opening bid. As he later explained, to go right past $4 \stackrel{•}{•}$ "must show the earth". His partner got the point and responded with his best suit, but having some values, bid not just $5 \stackrel{•}{•}$, but $6 \stackrel{•}{•}$ (!!).

So then North bid 7♦ (!!!). They were the only pair in the European Open Trials to bid the grand slam and they bid and made a grand slam, despite both players passing on the first round of the auction . . . !!!!!!!

In 2020, if any pair at the Paraparaumu Club can make any kind of a slam, small or grand, with both players having passed on the first round of bidding . . . then let me know. We'll have to organise a suitable prize/award/medal/tribute/decoration to mark your skill (and courage).
