

Long story short . . . they quickly establish the oh so solid fit in Hearts, and then Ged takes charge, asks for Aces (1) and then Kings (3), works out from Helen's oh so accurate responses that they have 3 Aces and he has a void in clubs, and they have all 4 Kings, and they have a huge Hearts fit . . . and sooooo **Ged goes straight to Seven Hearts!** 

I'm sitting over the 7 Hearts and I've got nothing much at all but I do have the Ace of Clubs . . . and I'm thinking "well, he might have a void in clubs or he might not, he might be hoping to toss a singleton club loser on the high cards in his partner's hand, or he might have miscalculated Helen's responses, or if he does get his 7 Hearts, well we're heading for a bottom board anyway" (ie too much thinking!) **So, I "double"!** 

# Big mistake. Ged just grins. He redoubles!

I lead the useless Ace of Clubs. He ruffs in hand, clears the trumps, and quickly claims all the 13 tricks. I concede (sheepishly). That's a mere 2240 points for a grand slam, doubled and redoubled, and a rock bottom for us.

Ged is gracious and courteous in victory. But at the same time, that great smile of Ged's is big, bigger than ever.

As we head off to the next table I can sense that my patient partner is looking just a little . . . well, sceptical? "At least they weren't vulnerable," I mutter, "that might have been really costly."
